





CATECHESIS (kat'i-ke'sis) n.

What is the meaning of the 1st commandment, "I am the Lord, your God"?

Because the Almighty has revealed himself to us as our God and Lord, we must not place anything above him or consider anything more important or give any other thing or person priority over him. To know God and to serve and worship him has absolute priority in our life. [2083-2094, 2133-2134]

God expects us to give him our full faith; we should place all our *hope* in him and direct all the strength of our love toward him. The commandment to love God is the most important of all commandments and the key to all the others. That is why it stands at the beginning of the Ten Commandments. (YOUCAT question 352)


KNOW YOUR SAINTS: Ss. Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus

The actions of these two influential Jewish leaders give insight into the charismatic power of Jesus and his teachings—and the risks that could be involved in following him.


Joseph was a respected, wealthy civic leader who had become a disciple of Jesus. Following the death of Jesus, Joseph obtained Jesus' body from Pilate, wrapped it in fine linen and buried it. For these reasons Joseph is considered the patron saint of funeral directors and pallbearers. More important is the courage Joseph showed in asking Pilate for Jesus' body. Jesus was a condemned criminal who had been publicly executed. According to some legends, Joseph was punished and imprisoned for such a bold act.

Nicodemus was a Pharisee and, like Joseph, an important first-century Jew. We know from John's Gospel that Nicodemus went to Jesus at night—secretly—to better understand his teachings about the kingdom. Later, Nicodemus spoke up for Jesus at the time of his arrest and assisted in Jesus' burial. We know little else about Nicodemus.



Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

2 Timothy 1:14. Guard this rich trust with the help of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us.

In today's second reading Saint Paul tells his beloved disciple Timothy to be passionate about living out the message of Christ, using the spirit of power, love, and self-control God has given him to help spread that message. Paul tells Timothy to not be ashamed of the testimony of Christ and to bear his share of hardship for the sake of the gospel. He says to guard the rich trust that dwells within him.

I believe we're living in a time when we are being called to bear our share of hardship for the gospel. Being Catholic is not easy these days. The church and its teachings are under attack both from outside and from the inside. We are being forced to speak up and defend our faith — we can no longer just be Catholic. How do we defend our faith? We need God's spirit of power and love.

Thankfully we have more Catholic resources available than ever before in the media. Our Catholic traditions afford us many ways to pray through adoration, the rosary, and the Mass. Christ gives himself through the Eucharist, so that he dwells within us.

In today's first reading Habakkuk is worn out from the violence, destruction, and discord all around him in Jerusalem. God sends him a vision and tells him: "Write down the vision...For the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come" (Habakkuk 2:2-3). The vision still has its time for fulfillment. I believe that, like Paul and Timothy, we need to wait, keep the vision, and not give up on our Catholic faith. *~Terri Knappenberger*
