



CATECHESIS (kat'i-ke'sis) n.

What is purgatory?

Purgatory, often imagined as a place, is actually a condition. Someone who dies in God's grace (and therefore at peace with God and men) but who still needs purification before he can see God face to face is in purgatory. [1030-1031]

When Peter had betrayed Jesus, the Lord turned around and looked at Peter: "And Peter went out and wept bitterly" – a feeling *like being in purgatory*. Just such a purgatory probably awaits most of us at the moment of our death: the Lord looks at us full of love – and we experience burning shame and painful remorse over our wicked or "merely" unloving behavior. Only after this purifying pain will we be capable of meeting his loving gaze in untroubled heavenly joy. (YOUCAT question 159)

Can we help the departed who are in the condition of purgatory?

Yes, since all those who are baptized into Christ form one communion and are united with one another, the living can also help the souls of the faithful departed in purgatory. [1032, 1414]

When a man is dead, he can do nothing more for himself. The time of active probation is past. But we can do something for the faithful departed in purgatory. Our love extends into the afterlife. Through our fasting, prayers, and good works, but especially through the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we can obtain grace for the departed. (YOUCAT question 160)

KNOW YOUR SAINTS

St. Bonaventure (1221 - 1274)



Bonaventure, Franciscan, theologian, doctor of the Church, was both learned and holy. Because of the spirit that filled him and his writings, he was at first called the Devout Doctor; but in more recent centuries he has been known as the Seraphic Doctor after the "Seraphic Father" Francis because of the truly Franciscan spirit he possessed.

Born in Bagnoregio, a town

in central Italy, he was cured of a serious illness as a boy through the prayers of Francis of Assisi. Later, he studied the liberal arts in Paris. Inspired by Francis and the example of the friars, especially of his master in theology, Alexander of Hales, he entered the Franciscan Order, and became in turn a teacher of theology in the university. Chosen as minister general of the Order in 1257, he was God's instrument in bringing it back to a deeper love of the way of St. Francis, both through the life of Francis, which he wrote at the behest of the brothers and through other works which defended the Order or explained its ideals and way of life.



Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

2 Timothy 4:2. Be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient.

Today's second reading and the gospel both call us to be persistent. Timothy tells us to "be persistent" even when it's inconvenient. In the gospel's parable we see that a woman's persistence pays off when a judge finally rules in her favor after her repeated appeals. And while the judge may be dishonest, the woman's belief in the justice system apparently never wavers.

While both passages ostensibly are about persistence, they are actually about the faith that underlies that persistence. Timothy also charges us to "Remain faithful to what you have learned and believed." It is impossible to be persistent without faith in the process. Whether it is a marriage, a career, or our relationship with God, it is a belief that the juice is worth the squeeze that keeps us hanging in, even when it is inconvenient. That belief — that faith — gives hope in an otherwise hopeless situation. And it is what fuels our persistence.




