

Introducing the Oratory

The Oratory of St. John Vianney at St. Anthony Church is a combination of the former parishes of St. Margaret-St. John Parish and St. Anthony Parish and is now part of St. Cecilia Parish.

What is an oratory?

According to the Code of Canon Law (Can.1223-1225), by the term *oratory* is understood a place for divine worship designated by permission of the ordinary (bishop) for the benefit of some community or group of the faithful who gather in it and to which other members of the faithful can also come with the consent of the competent superior. An oratory differs from a chapel because it is public, whereas a chapel is private.

Masses are Monday-Friday at 11:45 AM with Confessions following Mass. Weekend Masses are Saturday at 3 PM and Sunday at 9:30 AM. Confessions are heard one hour before the weekend Masses.

The Amice

The amice consists of a white cloth connected to two long ribbon-like attachments, by which it is fastened around the shoulders of the priest. Before the liturgical reforms of 1972, its use was mandatory for all Roman Catholic Masses, but it is only required today if the alb does not cover the priest's ordinary clothing. Many priests choose to wear the amice for reasons of tradition or to prevent damage to their other vestments due to perspiration.

While donning the amice, the priest first drapes the amice over his head (as with a hood), and then lowers it to his neck, tying it around his torso. During this action he prays a short prayer asking God to clothe

him with the "helmet of salvation." In fact, each of the vestments the priest wears for mass has both a spiritual and practical use. The practical use, as mentioned above, is to prevent damage to the other vestments due to perspiration. The spiritual use can be summed up in the prayer the priest prays while he puts on the Amice: "Place upon me, O Lord, the helmet of salvation, that I may overcome the assaults of the devil."

KNOW YOUR SAINTS

Blessed Pope Urban V (1310-1370)

In 1362, the man elected pope declined the office. When the cardinals could not find another person among them for that important office, they turned to a relative stranger: the holy person we honor today.

The new Pope Urban V proved a wise choice. A Benedictine monk and canon lawyer, he was deeply spiritual and brilliant. He lived simply and modestly, which did not always earn him friends among clergymen who had become used to comfort and privilege. Still, he pressed for reform and saw to the restoration of churches and monasteries. Except for a brief period he spent most of his eight years as pope living away from Rome at Avignon, seat of the papacy from 1309 until shortly after his death.

He came close but was not able to achieve one of his biggest goals—reuniting the Eastern and Western churches.

As pope, Urban continued to follow the Benedictine Rule. Shortly before his death in 1370 he asked to be moved from the papal palace to the nearby home of his brother so he could say goodbye to the ordinary people he had so often helped.

The Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 5:16. "Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father."

We know Jesus was born in Bethlehem, not the state of Missouri. But in today's readings — particularly the Old Testament reading and the Gospel — the theme seems to be "show me."

It's not so much about what we say, as it is about what we do. As the first reading tells us, "If you bestow your bread on the hungry and satisfy the afflicted; then light shall rise for you in the darkness, and the gloom shall become for you like midday" (Isaiah 58:10). And as the Gospel tells us, we ought not hide our light under a bushel basket. And that is the case, not because good deeds get us to Heaven — only God's grace makes that possible. But if we truly believe, we will feed the hungry and comfort the afflicted. One flows from the other.

Words have their place, and they can certainly inspire us to achieve great things. But the person who truly strives is more inspirational than any words. We are called today to show, rather than tell. **~Jack Greiner**
