


and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

# Divine Mercy Sunday April 16, 2023

To gain complete forgiveness we are given this promise...

"The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul

fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy.

Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. ... " – Diary of St. Faustina, Entry No. 699






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# EASTSIDE FAITH | 9

#### Catechesis (kat'i-ke'sis) n.

**Divine Mercy Sunday** — why did Pope John Paul begin celebrating this feast? It was revealed in the 1930's by our Lord to Saint Faustina that He would pour out His Mercy in great abundance before His second coming as the Just Judge. Saint Faustina was to spread the word of His mercy and to seek to have the Feast of Mercy celebrated. This papal act represents the highest endorsement that the Church can give to a private revelation, an act of papal infallibility proclaiming the certain sanctity of the mystic, and the granting of a universal feast, as request by Our Lord to St. Faustina.

A Day of Mercy and Pardon — celebrating and naming the Octave Day of Easter (Second Sunday of Easter) "Divine Mercy Sunday" recovers an ancient tradition that is reflected in a teaching attributed to St. Augustine about the Easter Octave, which he called "the days of mercy and pardon." Liturgically, the prayers and readings for this Sunday have always been centered on the theme of Divine mercy and forgiveness. This final day of the octave of Easter points us to the merciful love of God that lies behind the whole Paschal Mystery — the whole mystery of the death, burial and resurrection of Christ — made present for us in the Eucharist.

Why should we, as God's people, care? Jesus revealed to Saint Faustina that whoever approaches the Fountain of Life seeking His Mercy on this day will be granted complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. (excerpt from St. Faustina Diary entry #300). In other words, all our sins will be wiped away, including the time needed for restitution of our sins in purgatory. Saint Faustina recorded these words revealed to her by Jesus, "The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy." (St. Faustina Diary entry #99)




#### Know Your Saints: St. Ignatius of Antioch

Born in Syria, Ignatius converted to Christianity and eventually became bishop of Antioch. In the year 107, Emperor Trajan visited Antioch and forced the Christians there to choose between death and apostasy. Ignatius would not deny Christ and thus was condemned to be put to death in Rome.

Ignatius is well known for the seven letters he wrote on the long journey from Antioch to Rome. Five of these letters are to churches in Asia Minor; they urge the Christians there to remain faithful to God and to obey their superiors. He warns them against heretical doctrines, providing them with the solid truths of the Christian faith.

The sixth letter was to Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, who was later martyred for the faith. The final letter begs the Christians in Rome not to try to stop his martyrdom. "The only thing I ask of you is to allow me to offer the libation of my blood to God. I am the wheat of the Lord; may I be ground by the teeth of the beasts to become the immaculate bread of Christ."

Ignatius bravely met the lions in the Circus Maximus.



# THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

#### Second Sunday of Easter (Sunday of Divine Mercy)

# Acts of the Apostles 2:46. They ate their meals with exultation and sincerity of heart, praising God and enjoying favor with all the people.

How would you like to have been a fly on the wall, observing the apostles as they joyfully spread the good news of Christ? Their enthusiasm, commitment, and witness statements must have been very compelling to persuade the people of Jerusalem, Antioch, and throughout the Roman Empire that Jesus was real and walked among them.

Like Thomas, however, many people have doubt and a tough time believing that Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah. Why is that? Is it because they did not see him? Or they cannot reconcile his sacrifices with what they would do in similar situations? Or that he was so wise, in fact "wise beyond his years" (Luke 2:40, 52)?

What are some other things that people believe happened at the same time as Acts (about 70 AD) or even hundreds of years earlier? I don't think people question that great thinkers and writers such as Homer (8th Century BC), Pythagoras (~550 BC), Plato (~400 BC), Socrates (~450 BC), Euclid (~300 BC), Aristophanes (~200 BC), and Virgil (~50 BC) walked the earth. Nor do people doubt things that we can't see with our naked eyes such as protons/neutrons/electrons, gravity, and plate tectonics. Most of us can rationalize that those people and scientific principles were/are real. For the non-believers, the doubters, does the fact that our calendars have had the BC/AD split since about 525 AD convince them?

The second reading, from the first letter of Saint Peter, provides a great response: "Although you have not seen him you love him; even though you do not see him now yet believe in him, you rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, as you attain the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls." No doubt about it, that's a heck of a message! *~Bill Scoville*
