



Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I heal them. "But blessed are your eyes, because they see, and your ears, because they hear. Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

"Hear then the parable of the sower. St. Mary Knights of Columbus

Sometimes our volunteers are confronted with a situation that seems hopeless on the surface. We met a neighbor recently who was more than three years behind on paying rent and had received an eviction notice from her landlord.

Two of our volunteers visited her in her apartment and learned she had a full-time job and was raising two adolescent children. Her employer reduced her work hours dramatically during COVID, and she missed time with her children out of school. She could keep up with most of her bills but could not pay the rent.

We were impressed with her stability in that she had worked for the same employer for more than six years and lived in the same apartment for more than six years. Even though she had a fulltime job with benefits, the cost of caring for herself and two growing children was more than she could manage during the pandemic.

We learned that the SVDP main office had received some COVID relief funds from the City, and these monies were intended for situations like hers. We worked with our neighbor in filling out the application for this assistance. We contacted the landlord's attorney, who expressed willingness to work with her and postpone her eviction. Still, he wanted her to produce a budget that showed she could pay her ongoing expenses and catch up on the remaining rent. We worked with our neighbor to create a budget she could live with and submitted it to the landlord.

The result is that we were able to access the COVID relief funds to pay 15 months of back rent, and the landlord accepted her rent repayment plan and withdrew the eviction

Our SVDP volunteers encounter situations every day where our neighbors need the necessities of food, clothing, shelter....and a kind helping hand. We don't turn anyone away and try our best to meet their needs as best we can with available resources.




The Catechist's Corner

The Screwtape Letters by C.S. Lewis



It is a truth universally acknowledged, or at least it should be in my opinion, that every Catholic should read C.S. Lewis' The Screwtape Letters. And at that, read it more than once. In fact, several, several times. I'm convinced that over the past 8 years since I first read it, I have read it in full about 8 times, and certain passages I know I have read about

a dozen more. The reason for this is that, in spite of its having been published for the first time in 1942, Lewis' understanding of how the devil tempts the ordinary man in a variety of different scenarios is spellbinding. And rather than be paralyzed with a sense of fear or hopelessness at the amount of traps set by the evil one, the reader can't help but feel empowered to recognize the next snare and carefully avoid capture. This book could not be any more relevant in our modern moment and, above all, reinforces the power of God's mercy and ability to raise up saints in the darkest times. EXCITING NEWS: Religious Sisters to Teach and Reside in our Family

Having an order of religious sisters in parishes and in the schools of our churches has been a long standing tradition in our faith. It went "hand in hand", that if you had priests, you had religious sisters as well. In our family it was a long standing tradition to have religious sisters that taught in our schools and lived on campus. It is with great excitement that we are set to welcome the **Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary** to our Eastside Family of Parishes. Founded in India, this congregation of 1200 sisters is a teaching order and has educated hundreds of thousands of young women through their educational institutions, irrespective of caste and creed.

Here are some FAQs that have been received:

- 1. Why are we getting them? It is important in a Catholic family to have all the roles of the present. In this case, the sisters will be a motherly presence, complementing the priests.
- 2. When are they coming? Sometime in September. There is a great deal of work regarding visas that is currently being completed.
- 3. How many sisters are coming? We will be welcoming three sisters initially and a fourth will come later.
- 4. Where will they live? They will live in the red brick home owned by St. Mary's that is behind the rectory, on Monteith.
- 5. What are their qualifications? The sisters have teaching certificates, qualifying them to teach all the current courses in our schools. We are fortunate that the individuals coming to us hold master's degrees in mathematics and chemistry.
- 6. What will their role be? The sisters will initially be involved in religious education of students as well as act as aides and substitute teachers in the schools (both St. Cecilia and St. Mary). Natural attrition occurs every year, and the sisters will assume those vacancies at that time.
- 7. Do they speak English? Yes! They speak the Queen's English. Brilliantly!

THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 13:8. Some seed fell on rich soil and produced fruit a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold.

While today's readings revolve around seeds and soil, they really ask the question, "How much effort do you put into your relationship with God?"

Relationships have a natural ebb and flow. People come into and out of our lives. Who was your best friend in grade school? Are you still in contact today? We have many acquaintances – however, deep relationships are usually few. We have people in our lives that we may not have seen in years – but the second we reconnect, the friendship does not miss a beat because it has deep roots.

True friendships require effort, for love requires sacrifice. Who is on your speed dial in case there is an emergency at 3:00 am? God wants to be on that list. One of the ways to measure the depth of a relationship is by the time we spend with it, both the quantity as well as the quality. We need to do the same with the Lord, especially with prayer. We need to share all aspects of our lives with him – both joys and sufferings. When was the last time you caught up with God over a cup of coffee? Like with best friends, we need reveal our true selves with the Lord, and rest in his presence. We need to till our spiritual soil.

The Creator has planted seeds of hope, desire, and aspirations within each of us. As the archdiocesan vocations prayers states, we are created for a definite purpose. We need to discover, develop, and nurture those seeds. The Lord wants us to be a laborer in his mission field of evangelization. He wants us to help increase the harvest.
