



Safe Parish



The Archdiocese of Cincinnati in keeping with its policies has completed the five-year revision of the *Decree on Child Protection*. Each user with a Safe Parish account will need to download, acknowledge to have read and agree to abide by the requirements of the revised decree. If this is not completed within 30 days of the promulgation of the Decree by the Archbishop, the user's Safe Parish account will show as pending until the user completes the acknowledgement. AN INTERVIEW WITH DEACON JEREMY STUBBS

Could you please tell a little about your family and childhood? I am the middle of three boys. My older brother, my cousin, and I all have the same birthday. We grew up on a five-acre plot of land in the small rural town of Arnheim, OH (near Sardinia) - we belonged to St. Mary in Arnheim and that is where my brothers and I were baptized. What are you most looking forward to as a priest? I most look forward to hearing confessions.

What are you most enjoying about your work this summer with the Eastside Family of Parishes? I have most enjoyed being able to serve as a deacon in the parishes. I also enjoy working, so it is a nice balance of doing work at St. Cecelia School and doing ministry as a deacon in the family of parishes.

What is a little-known, interesting fact about you? I am a drummer and used to play in several bands. One band was fairly popular, and we played events at locations such as Fountain Square and Kings Island.



The Catechist's Corner

The Story of Thomas More by John Farrow



In a world that devours legal dramas like Suits and Law and Order, as well as cinematic biopics starring heroes misunderstood or unjustly convicted, there is perhaps no saint more culturally relevant than Thomas More. Though published in 1954, John Farrow's exciting and multi-layered retelling of this "man for all seasons" tale reads with full modern dramatic appeal as if Hans Zimmer was conducting his accompanying orchestra over each ear. This is the type of book that I have almost cancelled plans to read

(if that does not tell you everything you need to know!). Farrow is intentional in grounding his reader in the moment by letting them in on all the complex political and religious machinations of the day, and he paints More amidst this backdrop with full, developed strokes so as to gain your reverence for him in each of his roles: lawyer, father, and Catholic. May each of us, in reading this incredible work, feel inspired to follow in his footsteps by concluding our lives as not just our nation's good servants but, "God's first." – *Haley Metzger*


Religious Sisters to Teach and Reside in our Family

Having an order of religious sisters in parishes and in the schools of our churches has been a long standing tradition in our faith. It went "hand in hand," that if you had priests, you had religious sisters as well. In our family it was a long standing tradition to have religious sisters that taught in our schools and lived on campus. It is with great excitement that we are set to welcome the Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary to our Eastside Family of Parishes. Founded in India, this congregation of 1,200 sisters is a teaching order and has educated hundreds of thousands of young women through their educational institutions, irrespective of caste and creed.

Here are some FAQs that have been received:

- 1. Why are we getting them? It is important in a Catholic family to have all the roles of the family present. In this case, the sisters will be a motherly presence, complementing the priests.
- 2. When are they coming? Sometime in September. There is a great deal of work regarding visas that is currently being completed.
- 3. How many sisters are coming? We will be welcoming three sisters initially and a fourth will come later.
- 4. Where will they live? They will live in a red brick home on Monteith (behind the rectory) that is owned by St. Mary's.
- 5. What are their qualifications? The sisters have teaching certificates, qualifying them to teach all the current courses in our schools. We are fortunate that the individuals coming to us hold master's degrees in mathematics and chemistry.
- 6. What will their role be? The sisters will initially be involved in religious education of students as well as act as aides and substitute teachers in the schools (both St. Cecilia and St. Mary). Natural attrition occurs every year, and the sisters will assume those vacancies at that time.
- 7. Do they speak English? Yes! They speak the Queen's English. Brilliantly!

YOUR OFFERINGS

1 Kings 19:11-12. A strong and heavy wind was rending the mountains and crushing rocks before the Lord—but the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind there was an earthquake—but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake there was fire—but the Lord was not in the fire. After the fire there was a tiny whispering sound.

We expect God to manifest himself to us in different ways. Elijah expected God to act in the world through heavy wind, crushing rocks, earthquakes, and fire—through dramatic, obvious, easily discernable experiences. An Exodus, redux.

God chose another way. He acted through "a tiny whispering sound." God could have gone with the hard-to-miss natural phenomena that he used with Moses. That God went in a different direction is no accident. This difference teaches us something that we need to learn: when God wants our attention, he doesn't always rend mountains, crush rocks, or move the earth. He does do that sometime, of course. But, other times, he communicates in unexpected or subtly shocking ways.

Like Elijah, be open and attentive to God's tiny whispers in all their forms: from the people we overlook, the people who drive us crazy, and through accidents, happenstance, tragedy, and even the occasional miracle. *~Mike Keefe*
