

She shared in His suffering in the Passion and throughout His lifetime. Her life was also filled with sorrow and she remained faithful to her Son. She is our example of how to suffer hardship and tribulation in our lives.




Religious Sisters to Teach and Reside in our Family

Having an order of religious sisters in parishes and in the schools of our churches has been a long standing tradition in our faith. It went "hand in hand," that if you had priests, you had religious sisters as well. In our family it was a long standing tradition to have religious sisters that taught in our schools and lived on campus. It is with great excitement that we are set to welcome the Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary to our Eastside Family of Parishes. Founded in India, this congregation of 1,200 sisters is a teaching order and has educated hundreds of thousands of young women through their educational institutions, irrespective of caste and creed.

Here are some FAQs that have been received:

- 1. Why are we getting them? It is important in a Catholic family to have all the roles of the family present. In this case, the sisters will be a motherly presence, complementing the priests.
- 2. When are they coming? Sometime in September. There is a great deal of work regarding visas that is currently being completed.
- 3. How many sisters are coming? We will be welcoming three sisters initially and a fourth will come later.
- 4. Where will they live? They will live in a red brick home on Monteith (behind the rectory) that is owned by St. Mary's.
- 5. What are their qualifications? The sisters have teaching certificates, qualifying them to teach all the current courses in our schools. We are fortunate that the individuals coming to us hold master's degrees in mathematics and chemistry.
- 6. What will their role be? The sisters will initially be involved in religious education of students as well as act as aides and substitute teachers in the schools (both St. Cecilia and St. Mary). Natural attrition occurs every year, and the sisters will assume those vacancies at that time.
- 7. Do they speak English? Yes! They speak the Queen's English. Brilliantly!

THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

Twenty-First Sunday In Ordinary Time

Matthew 16:15. He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

An old Jewish joke goes, "Why does a rabbi always answer a question with another question?" The answer is, "Why shouldn't a rabbi answer a question with another question?"

God so rarely gives us the definitive answers we seek. Look at the Book of Job, where he questions God about the tragic circumstance he finds himself in. God responds not with answers but with questions for Job to contemplate that will lead him to discovery. The most durable lessons are those we discover in our own experience. How often have we been in a restaurant, and the waiter warns us that the dish is hot, yet we still need to touch it?

We all must answer this essential question - who do we say that Jesus is? Simon, afterward named Peter, is about to begin on this road of discovery. Simon is the first to answer Jesus' question, establishing himself as a leader of the disciples: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Then, like Abram to Abraham and Jacob to Israel, Jesus changes Simon's name to Peter – the rock on which he will build his church. At this point, Peter is not the rock he will become after Pentecost. Ten chapters later in Matthew, he denies knowing Jesus three times. However, it is reassuring that Jesus places his faith in what Peter can become. God sees the potential in us, even though we often fall short. Peter's experiences will harden him into the rock God needs

Sometimes we get clear answers to our prayers. When we don't, we should consider whether we are getting a question back instead.


