What are angels?

Angels are pure spiritual creatures of God who have understanding and will. They have no bodies, cannot die, and are usually not visible. They live constantly in God's presence and convey God's will and God's protection to men. [328-333, 350-351]

An angel, wrote Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, is "so to speak the personal thought with which God is turned toward me". At the same time the angels are turned completely toward their Creator. They burn with love for him and serve him day and night. Their song of praise is never-ending. In Sacred Scripture the angels who have fallen away from God are called devils or demons. (YOUCAT question 54)

KNOW YOUR SAINTS: St. Adalbert of Prague (956-997)

Opposition to the Good News of Jesus did not discourage Adalbert, who is now remembered with great honor in the Czech Republic, Poland, Hungary and Germany.

Born to a noble family in Bohemia, he received part of his education from St. Adalbert of Magdeburg. At the age of 27 he was chosen as bishop of Prague. Those who resisted his program of clerical reform forced him into exile eight years later.

In time, the people of Prague requested his return as their bishop. Within a short time, however, he was exiled again after excommunicating those who violated the right of sanctuary by dragging a woman accused of adultery from a church and murdering her. After a short ministry in Hungary, he went to preach the Good News to people

living near the Baltic Sea. He and two companions were martyred by pagan priests in that region. Adalbert's body was immediately ransomed and buried in Gniezno cathedral (Poland). In the mid-11th century his relics were moved to St. Vitus Cathedral in Prague.



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WORD IN YOUR HEART

Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time



Philemon 17. So if you regard me as a partner, welcome him as you would me.

Mark Twain once said, "I didn't have time to write you a short letter, so I wrote you a long one." Today's second reading shows that Paul had a lot of time on his hands and the power that a well-written letter has. Paul's letter is very brief (which is very rare for him!) and free of run-on sentences (which is also not common!). In just 25 verses he shares with us his current situation (in jail), his age, his strong friendship with Onesimus, and his respect for Philemon. His descriptiveness is almost Shakespearean.

Onesimus apparently carried Paul's letter with him as he rejoined his former master, Philemon. A letter was the perfect communication device: it forced Philemon to re-evaluate his opinion of Onesimus while reading that Paul considered Onesimus to be an equal. Today's communications by tweets, emails, and even FaceTime are too immediate and don't carry the gravity of the hand-written word.

Paul's letter also has a very warm opening: "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" And he followed that with a line that would make it tough for Philemon to say no to Paul: "I give thanks to my God always, remembering you in my prayers, as I hear of the love and the faith you have in the Lord Jesus and for all the holy ones, so that your partnership in the faith may become effective in recognizing every good there is in us that leads to Christ." He sure boxed Philemon in with those words!

I don't know how Twain would have finished the reflection, but Paul's closing words we read today make it clear that because of their shared faith in Christ, Onesimus is no longer a slave but a brother: "Welcome him as you would me." ~Bill Scoville

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
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
