

CATECHESIS (kat'i-ke'sis) n. What does the "communion of saints" mean?

The "communion of saints" is made up of all men and women who have placed their hope in Christ and belong to him through Baptism, whether they have already died or are still alive. Because in Christ we are one Body, we live in a communion that encompasses heaven and earth. [946-962]

The Church is larger and more alive than we think. Among her members are the living and the deceased (whether they are still undergoing a process of purification or are already in the glory of God), individuals known and unknown, great saints and inconspicuous persons. We can help one another even beyond the grave. We can call on our patrons and favorite saints, but also our departed relatives and friends whom we believe are already with God. Conversely, by our intercessory prayer, we can come to the aid of our dear departed who are still undergoing purification. Whatever the individual does or suffers in and for Christ benefits all. Conversely, this unfortunately means also that every sin harms the communion. (YOUCAT question 146)



KNOW YOUR SAINTS *Ss. Joachim and Anne*

In the Scriptures, Matthew and Luke furnish a legal family history of Jesus, tracing ancestry to show that Jesus is the culmination of great

promises. Not only is his mother's family neglected, we also know nothing factual about them except that they existed. Even the names Joachim and Anne come from a legendary source written more than a century after Jesus died.

The heroism and holiness of these people, however, is inferred from the whole family atmosphere around Mary in the Scriptures. Whether we rely on the legends about Mary's childhood or make guesses from the information in the Bible, we see in her a fulfillment of many generations of prayerful persons, herself steeped in the religious traditions of her people.

The strong character of Mary in making decisions, her continuous practice of prayer, her devotion to the laws of her faith, her steadiness at moments of crisis, and her devotion to her relatives—all indicate a closeknit, loving family that looked forward to the next generation even while retaining the best of the past.

Joachim and Anne—whether these are their real names or not—represent that entire quiet series of generations who faithfully perform their duties, practice their faith and establish an atmosphere for the coming of the Messiah, but remain obscure.

THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time

Wisdom 11:23-24. You have mercy on all... and you overlook people's sins that they may repent. For you love all things that are and loathe nothing that you have made.

In my younger years I learned scripture through two primary sources: my 6th grade teacher at Guardian Angels School and the contemporary hymns that became popular post-Vatican II.

Sister Carmen Marie spoke of Bible figures as if they were close friends, and of the apostles like former students of whom she was particularly proud. She retold the gospels in her own lively way, stressing always the humanity as well as the spirituality of the people in them — and the unwavering love Jesus had for them all, along with infinite patience.

Sister Carmine loved Zacchaeus, the little man who proved big things are possible with God —and was especially animated when telling the story of this wealthy, important person (unfortunately also a tax collector and short of physical stature), who put all dignity aside and climbed a tree to see Jesus. When this gospel is read I still hear her words in my head, accompanied by the hymn "Zacchaeus," sung by the Medical Mission Sisters in cheerful voices with perfect diction, to an unexpected Afro Calypso beat. (From their 1966 album Joy is Like the Rain - listen to it on YouTube. Both Sister Carmen and the Medical Mission Sisters focused on how Jesus' immense love brought about an immediate and complete change in Zacchaeus.

But when I reflect on this gospel from my adult perspective, I cynically think, "No one important would ever do such a thing." Even picturing Danny DeVito as Zacchaeus doesn't make the story plausible. So I must put aside the voices from younger days and look to the rest of today's scripture for the meaning and message. In addition to Wisdom (cited above), there is this from Saint Paul (another of Sister Carmen's favorites): "We pray for you, that God may make you worthy of his calling" (2 Thessalonians 1:11). And from Jesus himself: "For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10).

Whatever crazy things we humans may do, forgiveness and salvation can come to us. All things are indeed possible with ~Janet Buening God.
