# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

### **First Reading**

#### 2 Mc 7:1-2, 9-14

It happened that seven brothers with their mother were arrested and tortured with whips and scourges by the king, to force them to eat pork in violation of God's law. One of the brothers, speaking for the others, said: "What do you expect to achieve by questioning us? We are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors."

At the point of death he said: "You accursed fiend, you are depriving us of this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever. It is for his laws that we are dying."

After him the third suffered their cruel sport. He put out his tongue at once when told to do so, and bravely held out his hands, as he spoke these noble words: "It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." Even the king and his attendants marveled at the young man's courage, because he regarded his sufferings as nothing. After he had died, they tortured and maltreated the fourth brother in the same way. When he was near death, he said, "It is my choice to die at the hands of men with the hope God gives of being raised up by him; but for you, there will be no resurrection to life."

Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman but died childless. Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her." Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord, ' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."







# CATECHESIS (kat'i-ke'sis) n.

#### What happens when we die?

In death, body and soul are separated. The body decays, while the soul goes to meet God and waits to be reunited with its risen body on the Last Day. [992-1004, 1016-1018]

How the resurrection will take place is a mystery. An image can help us to accept it: When we look at a tulip bulb we cannot tell into what a marvelously beautiful flower it will develop in the dark earth. Similarly, we know nothing about the future appearance of our new body. Paul is nevertheless certain: "It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory" (1 Corinthians 15:43a). (YOUCAT question 154)



### **KNOW YOUR SAINTS** *St. Sharbel Makhluf (1828 - 1898)*

Although this saint never traveled far from the Lebanese village of Beka-Kafra, where he was born, his influence has spread widely.

Joseph Zaroun Makluf was raised by an uncle because his father, a mule driver, died when Joseph was only three. At the age of 23, Joseph joined the

Monastery of St. Maron at Annaya, Lebanon, and took the name Sharbel in honor of a second-century martyr. He professed his final vows in 1853 and was ordained six years later.

Following the example of the fifth-century St. Maron, Sharbel lived as a hermit from 1875 until his death. His reputation for holiness prompted people to seek him to receive a blessing and to be remembered in his prayers. He followed a strict fast and was very devoted to the Blessed Sacrament. When his superiors occasionally asked him to administer the sacraments to nearby villages, Sharbel did so gladly.

He died in the late afternoon on Christmas Eve. Christians and non-Christians soon made his tomb a place of pilgrimage and of cures. Pope Paul VI beatified him in 1965 and canonized him 12 years later.

# THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### Luke 20:38. "He is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

I used to think this phrase meant that God was for those of us still alive on Earth, not necessarily for those who had died; that he was there for us to rely upon (which he is). But now I understand this differently —even though a person's physical body has passed, their soul is still alive for eternity, and they surround us and are with us always.

For instance, when we attend Mass, the priest says "with all the angels and saints"; this means they are with us during Mass. Not coincidentally, we just read the Beatitudes on All Saints Day earlier this week. Saints are those who recognize that the kingdom of God is at hand and respond by living its attitudes fully in this life. In other words, we can all be saints! And at all times, including at Mass, all the souls of our faithfully departed are with us. But the real question is: do you see them or feel them? Do you really believe they are there?

In the old movie, The Santa Clause, when Tim Allen's character goes to the North Pole for the first time and has a hard time believing it exists, Bernard, the head elf, says kids don't need to see this to know it exists; they just believe it, so they can see it. Why, as adults, do we need to see something to believe it exists? The Church's motto is Lex orandi, lex credenda: we pray what we believe.

Wouldn't our prayers be more intentional and meaningful if we knew we were surrounded and supported by all those departed souls cheering for us in heaven? ~ *Chris Bergman*
