





November 20, 2022

Farewell, Monsignor

This weekend we celebrate our good friend, Monsignor Frank Lane. As many of you know, Monsignor has been recalled to the Diocese of Columbus, where he will take up residence at Saint Joseph Cathedral in Columbus, Ohio. His assignment will be to assist Bishop Earl Fernandes. Monsignor Lane has served the Archdiocese of Cincinnati since 2010, when he was named spiritual director at Mount St. Mary's Seminary, a post he held through 2016. It was our lucky day in 2010 when Monsignor asked me if he could preside regularly at St. Cecilia. I gladly accepted his offer and all of us have truly been blessed by his ministry. He has been an invaluable scholarly and spiritual resource, not only for me and the priests assigned to me, but also to all of you for



the past 12 years. He has also been a great and loyal friend. To say he will be missed is a tremendous understatement — his absence will be sorely felt. I know that like me, many of you are truly sad at his departure from our family. Know that he struggles leaving as well. He has loved his work in the parishes and has been fortified by the contributions he made to the Eastside Pastoral Region. In gratitude for his faithful service to St. Cecilia, St. Margaret-St. John and St. Anthony and the whole of the archdiocese, including its priests and faithful, will say farewell to him **this Sunday, November 20, at a special Mass at 2 PM at St. Cecilia. A reception will follow in the St. Cecilia gym.**



Contrary the belief that THANKSGIVING has been celebrated since the time of the pilgrims as a day of thanks for their harvest, this holiday was instituted in 1863 by President Abraham Lincoln to give thanks to God not only for our country's abundance but for our unity after The Civil War. In that way, no other secular American holiday invokes the profound and deep meaning and purpose of our Sacrament of the Eucharist. We will celebrate Thanksgiving at the 9:00 AM Masses at St. Cecilia and St. Mary

on Thursday, November 24, as a day of sincere thanks to God for our great and abundant gifts and for a greatly needed renewal of American unity. What is Grace?

KNOW YOUR SAINTS

St. Rose of Viterbo (1233-1251)

Rose achieved sainthood in only 18 years of life. Even as a child Rose had a great desire to pray and to aid the poor. While still very young, she began a life of penance in her parents' house. She was as generous to the poor as she was strict with herself. At the age of 10 she became a Secular Franciscan and soon began

preaching in the streets about sin and the sufferings of Jesus.

Viterbo, her native city, was then in revolt against the pope. When Rose took the pope's side against the emperor, she and her family were exiled from the city. When the pope's side won in Viterbo, Rose was allowed to return. Her attempt at age 15 to found a religious community failed, and she returned to a life of prayer and penance in her father's home, where she died in 1251. Rose was canonized in 1457.

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Psalm 122:1. "We will go up to the house of the LORD."

When I was a child, my family did not have a car, so each Sunday in all kinds of weather we walked several blocks to St. Mary for Mass. Whether a slow walk or a hurried rush to get to church on time, the goal was always the same: to enter into the house of the Lord. The beauty of the sun bringing the stained-glass windows to life was captivating for a child. The intricate wood carvings and statues are still breathtaking.

What do I discover now, as an adult, when I go up and enter the house of the Lord?

As we proclaim in today's psalm response, going to church is a time for rejoicing. It is the house of the Lord; the burning red sanctuary light is a sign of Christ's presence in the tabernacle. It is a place to pray and reflect on the many ways that the Lord Jesus Christ is not only King of the Universe but also a part of our everyday lives. 
