





Exciting news! Soon and very soon you will notice a new and permanent guest in our St. Mary's sanctuary. Who is this timely edition? The guest is our Lord Himself! That's right, Jesus present in the Most Blessed Sacrament will now be reserved in the sanctuary at St. Mary's Church. The tabernacle will be moved

from the St. Joseph side altar to a new beautiful altar of repose behind the main altar in the sanctuary.

Why? This move is in response to our bishops' plea for a "Eucharistic revival." We need a revival because there is a crisis of faith in our world — possibly the worst crisis our world has seen in many centuries. The Pew Research study, conducted in February 2019, found that around 70% of Catholics do not believe in Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist. This is the most disheartening and troubling news as believers and disciples of Christ. The Eucharist is, as Vatican II pronounced, the "source and summit of the Christian life." Jesus tells us Himself, "My flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink" (John 6:55) — not a symbol, but reality. The early Christians in Rome had a mantra that without the Eucharist, "We cannot exist!" We love Jesus's true body and blood in

Holy Communion, and in response to our world's crisis of faith, we are going to show Him our faith by giving him the spotlight location in our sanctuary.

The tabernacle is the golden box where Holy Communion is reserved. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "The Most Blessed Sacrament should be reserved in a tabernacle in a part of the church that is truly noble, prominent, conspicuous, worthily decorated, and suitable for prayer...[and] readily noticeable." Pope Benedict also taught this, "The correct positioning of the tabernacle contributes to the recognition of Christ's real presence in the Blessed Sacrament. Therefore, the place where the eucharistic species are reserved, marked by a sanctuary lamp, should be readily visible to everyone entering the church."

What should we do? With the tabernacle in the sanctuary, parishioners now genuflect before entering/exiting their pew in acknowledgement of His presence among us.

When? We hope to bring our Lord into the sanctuary at St. Mary during this Christmas season. This will be a gift to our Child-King by giving him the central space of our Church and in our hearts this Christmas.

The Third Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 35:1. The desert and the parched land will exult; the steppe will rejoice and bloom.

The first time I laid eyes on the desert, I thought I'd landed on the moon. Having grown up in Cincinnati and studied in the Blue Ridge Mountains, Albuquerque's barren landscape was utterly foreign to me. The red-brown cratered surface around me seemed completely devoid of life, at least as I knew it. Where was the green?? The trees, bushes, grass?

As I spent time out there, I learned the desert was full of life. One of my favorite discoveries was learning about Pleopeltis polypodioides, commonly known as the resurrection fern. Aptly named, this fern can lay dormant for weeks, even months, to survive drought. For all intents and purposes, it appears dead, completely wilted. But even a splash from your Nalgene can revive it. Within minutes, the fern uncoils itself and springs back to life.

This Gaudete Sunday we rejoice with the desert and the steppe as we anticipate God coming into this world to revive our weary souls. May his beauty and grace bloom in each of us this Advent. Christina Webster Stanek


