

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, All make a profound bow:


and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent December 18, 2022

Exciting news! Soon and very soon you will notice a new and permanent guest in our St. Mary's sanctuary. Who is this timely edition? The guest is our Lord Himself! That's right, Jesus present in the Most Blessed Sacrament will now be reserved in the sanctuary at St. Mary's Church. The tabernacle will be moved

from the St. Joseph side altar to a new beautiful altar of repose behind the main altar in the sanctuary.

Why? This move is in response to our bishops' plea for a "Eucharistic revival." We need a revival because there is a crisis of faith in our world — possibly the worst crisis our world has seen in many centuries. The Pew Research study, conducted in February 2019, found that around 70% of Catholics do not believe in Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist. This is the most disheartening and troubling news as believers and disciples of Christ. The Eucharist is, as Vatican II pronounced, the "source and summit of the Christian life." Jesus tells us Himself, "My flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink" (John 6:55) — not a symbol, but reality. The early Christians in Rome had a mantra that without the Eucharist, "We cannot exist!" We love Jesus's true body and blood in

Holy Communion, and in response to our world's crisis of faith, we are going to show Him our faith by giving him the spotlight location in our sanctuary.

The tabernacle is the golden box where Holy Communion is reserved. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, " The Most Blessed Sacrament should be reserved in a tabernacle in a part of the church that is truly noble, prominent, conspicuous, worthily decorated, and suitable for prayer...[and] readily noticeable." Pope Benedict also taught this, "The correct positioning of the tabernacle contributes to the recognition of Christ's real presence in the Blessed Sacrament. Therefore, the place where the eucharistic species are reserved, marked by a sanctuary lamp, should be readily visible to everyone entering the church."

What should we do? With the tabernacle in the sanctuary, parishioners now genuflect before entering/exiting their pew in acknowledgement of His presence among us.

When? We hope to bring our Lord into the sanctuary at St. Mary during this Christmas season. This will be a gift to our Child-King by giving him the central space of our Church and in our hearts this Christmas.

In this study, we will explore St. Joseph's role in salvation history in the context of major figures from the Old Testament and their struggles to embody the masculine virtues required for their God given missions.





Second, if you're anything like me, you might struggle with the opening of this Sunday's first reading. Isaiah is talking to Ahaz, the king of Judah, about asking God for a "sign" of his fidelity, and God challenges him to do so. Now, from my experience (little it may be), anytime I hear someone in the Bible ask God for a sign, it shows a lack of faith on part of the asker. I mean, Jesus even said, "An evil and unfaithful generation seeks a sign, but no sign will be given it except the sign of Jonah the prophet" (Matthew 12:39). Why the contradiction of policy? Should we ask for signs or not? Does God need to spell it out for us? Grr!

Well, here's what a young Catholic gentleman thinks. The King of Judah is faced with war against two neighboring nations, and, no surprise, God intervenes. God reminds King Ahaz that the covenant with David would still stand, and God, our Father, will keep Judah safe. Beautiful! "Yep, and I'll show you — in 800 years," said God. Wah.

The moral of this Sunday's readings (and the rest of this Advent season) — God is with us to the end; he loves us unconditionally and fully: we are family. Merry Christmas, Family of Parishes! *Sean McFadden*
