

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD


First Reading Gn 2:7-9; 3:1-7

The LORD God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being. Then the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and placed there the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the LORD God made various trees grow that were delightful to look at and good for food, with the tree of life in the middle of the garden and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the animals that the LORD God had made. The serpent asked the woman, "Did God really tell you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?" 
The Chasuble

The chasuble is the vestment proper to he who celebrates the Holy Mass. In the past the liturgical books used the two Latin terms "casual" and "planeta" synonymously. While the term "planeta" was especially used in Rome and has remained in use in Italy, the term "casula" derives from the typical form of the vestment that at the beginning completely covered the sacred minister who wore it. The Latin "casula" is found in other languages in a modified form. Thus one finds "casulla" in Spanish, "chasuble" in French and English, and "Kasel" in German.

The prayer for the donning of the chasuble references the exhortation in the Letter to the Colossians (3:14) — "Above all these things [put on] charity, which

is the bond of perfection" — and the Lord's words in Matthew, 11:30: "O Lord, who has said, My yoke is sweet and My burden light," grant that I may so carry it as to merit Thy grace."

During Lent, we will pray the Stations of the Cross every Friday at 9:30 AM and 7 PM at St. Cecilia and on Thursdays after the 5:30 PM Mass at St. Mary. During this special devotion, through meditation and prayer, we will walk with our Savior on his way of suffering from the time he was condemned to death until he died and



was buried. Making this devotion part of your Lenten commitment to prayer will help you grow closer to Christ.

Know Your Saints

St. Adrian of Canterbury (d. 710)

Though St. Adrian turned down a papal request to become Archbishop of Canterbury, England, Pope St. Vitalian accepted the rejection on the condition that Adrian serve as the Holy Father's assistant and adviser. Adrian accepted, but ended up spending most of his life and doing most of his work in Canterbury.

Born in Africa, Adrian was serving as an abbot in Italy when the new Archbishop of Canterbury appointed him abbot of the monastery of Sts. Peter and Paul in Canterbury. Thanks to his leadership skills, the facility became one of the most important centers of learning. The school attracted many outstanding scholars from far and wide and produced numerous future bishops and archbishops. Students reportedly learned Greek and Latin and spoke Latin as well as their own native languages.

Adrian taught at the school for 40 years. He died there, probably in the year 710, and was buried in the monastery. Several hundred years later, when reconstruction was being done, Adrian's body was discovered in an incorrupt state. As word spread, people flocked to his tomb, which became famous for miracles. Rumor had it that young schoolboys in trouble with their masters made regular visits there.





THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

First Sunday of Lent

Genesis 2:9. ...with the tree of life in the middle of the garden and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

It is wild to think that many Christians' beliefs of sin and of God come from the first book in the Bible, the creation story. The story itself is almost comedic. Maybe that was the point. This story in our culture has split Christians into two different camps: those who take every story in the Bible literally and those who see many of the stories as parables that teach a lesson.

I have never felt at peace with the image of God in the creation story. "You can eat from any tree in the garden but not the tree of knowledge, of truth." It feels like a cruel prank that a parent or friend would do to a younger child. Once the child slips up and eats from the tree, the parent becomes wrathful, jealous, and punitive. He punishes not only his child but every future child born into this world. This parent doesn't sound very patient or merciful. I wouldn't want to be his child. The God that I know and want to know is the image of Jesus.

We are taught to treat each other in almost the opposite way that God treats Adam and Eve. The inception of guilt and original sin come from this story. We are made to believe that we are born into sin and are bad from day one because of this story. How sad!

As we enter the Lenten season, let us be humble enough to let God reveal who God is. Instead of blindly adhering to someone's views, maybe it is time for us to realize that we all have the authority to discern for ourselves. Without going within ourselves, we will always be a slave to someone else's reality of who God is. We all have a unique relationship with the Creator that needs to alive in the world.




