Almighty Father, You have created for us some definite purpose.



Gospel Jn 9:1-41

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither he nor his parents sinned; it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him. We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day. Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" —which means Sent—. So he went and washed, and came back able to see. His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is," but others said, "No, he just looks like him." He said, "I am." So they said to him, "How were your eyes opened?" He replied, "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and told me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' So I went there and washed and was able to see." And they said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I don't know."

They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

Now the Jews did not believe that he had been blind and gained his sight until they summoned the parents of the one who had gained his sight. They asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How does he now see?" His parents answered and said, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. We do not know how he sees now, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him, he is of age; he can speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone acknowledged him as the Christ, he would be expelled from the synagogue. For this reason his parents said, "He is of age; question him." So a second time they called the man who had been blind and said to him, "Give God the praise! We know that this man is a sinner." He replied, "If he is a sinner, I do not know. One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see." So they said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I told you already and you did not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you want to become his disciples, too?" They ridiculed him and said, "You are that man's disciple; we are disciples of Moses! We know that God spoke to Moses, but we do not know where this one is from." The man answered and said to them, "This is what is so amazing, that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if one is devout and does his will, he listens to him. It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything." They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out.

When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, the one speaking with you is he." He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him. Then Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind."

Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not also blind, are we?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would have no sin; but now you are saying, 'We see,' so your sin remains.


Introducing the Oratory: Masses and Sacraments

Catechesis (kat'i-ke'sis) n. The Dalmatic

We continue our mini-series on the liturgical vestments of the priest and deacon. Today, we shall focus on the next liturgical vestment: the Dalmatic.

The dalmatic is a long wide-sleeved tunic worn by a deacon at Mass, which serves as a liturgical vestment in the Catholic Church. Although infrequent, it may also be worn by bishops above the alb and below the chasuble. Like the chasuble worn by priests and bishops, it is an outer vestment and is supposed to match the liturgical color of the day.

In 18th century vestment fashion, it is customary to slit the underside of the sleeves so that the dalmatic becomes a mantle like a scapular with an opening for the head and two square pieces of the material falling from the shoulder over the upper arm. Modern dalmatics tend to be longer and have closed sleeves, with the sides being open below the sleeve. The distinctive ornamentation of the vestment consists of two vertical stripes running from the shoulder to the hem.

Know Your Saints St. Agnes of Assisi (1197-1253)

Agnes was the sister of St. Clare and her first follower. When Agnes left home two weeks after Clare's departure, their family attempted to bring Agnes back by force. They tried to drag her out of the monastery, but all of a sudden her body became so heavy that several knights could not budge it. Her uncle Monaldo tried to strike her but was temporarily paralyzed. The knights then left Agnes and Clare in peace.


Agnes matched her sister in devotion to prayer and in willingness to endure the strict penances which characterized their lives at San Damiano. In 1221 a group of Benedictine nuns in Monticelli (near Florence) asked to become Poor Clares. St. Clare sent Agnes to become abbess of that monastery. Agnes soon wrote a rather sad letter about how much she missed Clare and the other nuns at San Damiano. After establishing other Poor Clare monasteries in northern Italy, Agnes was recalled to San Damiano in 1253 when Clare was dying. Agnes followed Clare in death three months later and was canonized in 1753.





THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Ephesians 5:8. You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light.

Today's gospel is a powerful mini-play about light, ignorance, and faith. Seeing a blind man begging, the disciples ask Jesus whose sin caused the man to be born without sight. Jesus replies that the man's blindness is not from sin but so "the works of God might be visible through him." Saying, "While I am in the world, I am the light of the world," Jesus makes clay, puts it on the man's eyes, and tells him to go wash. Healed, the man tells his story to his astounded neighbors, who in their disbelief take him to the Pharisees, where he repeats the account. The authorities then call in his parents to verify the man's blindness and healing, but they are afraid and tell the Pharisees to question their son directly. So the man tells his story a third time and, with his exasperation growing, adds, "If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything." The angry Pharisees berate him and throw him out. Jesus then seeks and finds the man, asks "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" - and identifies himself. The man's immediate reply: "I do believe, Lord."

When I read this gospel, I wonder what my role in it might have been. Would I be like the disciples, ready to cast blame for the man's misfortune? Or the neighbors who doubted the miracle, the Pharisees who thought only they could determine righteousness, or the parents afraid to speak what they believed to be true? I hope - I pray - I would have the faith of that blind man, ready to see, accept, and proclaim the light of God that came into my

Light is much needed in our dark world today. On this Laetare Sunday, when we are called to rejoice in the salvation of Easter that is coming, may we allow Jesus into our lives and all the uneven, spotted places where light can heal and bring joy! May we in turn live as the light we are meant to be.

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
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
