



He Has Risen April 9, 2023

Today we celebrate the beautiful feast of Easter. There is a happy ending following the agony in the garden, the mocking, the scourging, the carrying of the cross, and the crucifixion and death of our Lord. He humbled himself and became like us, enduring the worst of humanity. Despite all of that incomprehensible suffering, Jesus emerged victorious over sin and death. We are shown his power as the Messiah but, perhaps more importantly, we are shown that death cannot defeat Him.

The greatest lesson of the Easter resurrection is that death doesn't have to have power over us either. Like Christ, we can be victorious over death. Our earthly existence need not see the end of our "lives," but rather be the introductory chapter — one that leads us to be united with God for all eternity.

This eternal reward, however, becomes possible to us only because Jesus also conquers sin. He rises above the sins of this world by offering himself up as the Lamb of God. We are given the opportunity to become his children, rising above our own sins and the sins of the whole world. We can all share in the joyousness that comes at the end of His earthly life. We can blossom as God intends — becoming reflections of love itself as revealed in Jesus.

Through God's revelation of Himself, we are encouraged to truly live this life by uniting ourselves with the Father — no longer slaves to our own wishes and desires, but rather living for the highest of all aspirations — being united to God in this life and, hopefully, the next. This is the Easter joy that we celebrate and that permeates our senses today. That is the new life that we embrace and that overshadows the cross and allows this world to be as God wishes it for us.

Amen? Amen.

Catechesis (kat'i-ke'sis) n. EASTER

Easter is the celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is celebrated on Sunday, and marks the end of Holy Week, the end of Lent, the last day of the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday), and is the beginning of the Easter season of the liturgical year.

As we know from the Gospels, Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day following his crucifixion, which would be Sunday. His resurrection marks the triumph of good over evil, sin and death. It is the singular event which proves that those who trust in God and accept Christ will be raised from the dead.

Since Easter represents the fulfillment of God's promises to mankind, it is the most important holiday on the Christian calendar.

In the Gospels, the precise details of the Easter narrative vary slightly, but none of these variances are critical to the main story. In fact, it is argued that the variances are simply matters of style and not substance. Despite the variances, the key aspects of the Easter story all match. Above all, they agree that the tomb of Christ was indeed empty, which is the most essential fact.

Based on direct evidence from the mid-second century, it is believed that Easter was regularly celebrated from the earliest days of the Church.

The Easter date is movable and always falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25. Easter in the Roman Catholic Church is always on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox.




Know Your Saints: St. Thérèse of Lisieux (1873-1897)

"I prefer the monotony of obscure sacrifice to all ecstasies. To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul." These are the words of Thérèse of the Child Jesus, a Carmelite nun called the "Little Flower," who lived a cloistered life of obscurity in the convent of Lisieux, France. And her preference for hidden sacrifice did indeed convert souls. Few saints of God are more popular than this young nun. Her autobiography, The Story of a Soul, is read and loved throughout the world. Thérèse Martin entered the convent at the age of 15 and died in 1897 at the age of 24. She was canonized in 1925, and two years later she and St. Francis Xavier were declared co-patrons of the missions.

Life in a Carmelite convent is indeed uneventful and consists mainly of prayer and hard domestic work. But Thérèse possessed that holy insight that redeems the time, however dull that time may be. She saw in qui-

et suffering redemptive suffering, suffering that was indeed her apostolate. Thérèse said she came to the Carmel convent "to save souls and pray for priests." And shortly before she died, she wrote: "I want to spend my heaven doing good on earth."

On October 19, 1997, Pope John Paul II proclaimed her a Doctor of the Church, the third woman to be so recognized, in light of her holiness and the influence on the Church of her teaching on spirituality. Her parents, Louis and Zélie were beatified in 2008.







The Resurrection of the Lord

Sequence - Victimæ paschali laudes. "The tomb of Christ who is living, the glory of Jesus' resurrection; bright angels attesting, the shroud and napkin resting. Yes, Christ my hope is arisen; to Galilee he goes before you." Christ indeed from death is risen, our new life obtaining.

When we think of Easter, we often jump from the darkened skies of Good Friday to the resplendent light of the resurrected Christ. And yet Easter begins at daybreak, the place where light and dark meet. Christ first appears in the form of a gardener, to greet Mary at his empty tomb. His resurrection first brings hope in the place where sorrow and joy meet.

As poet Robert Frost wrote, I, too, am "acquainted with the night." We all are, in its endless iterations— be it the death of a loved one, a tragic accident, chronic illness, broken relationships, etc. Like many, I've been crippled by bouts of depression, a heavy stone that obscures hope.

And yet God enters into our darkest moments, when hope is buried in the tomb. During one spell, Christ came and sat down next to me on the kitchen floor, in the form of my mother. "We will get through this," she said. And we did.

This is the painful and beautiful paradox of Easter: "the tomb of Christ who is living." It's God meeting us at the tomb, telling us that we will get through this together. That Christ is with us always, even though things may look different: Christ is no longer tangible and visible as the man who walked this earth for 33 years, but rather he is tangible and visible in all of us now. The rock has been laid aside, the linens folded, because the mortal vessel of God has been shattered, and metamorphosed into a living and breathing body of Christ comprised of all of us. We are his hands, his feet, his voice, his eyes. His spirit is alive in us. And in him we have eternal life. Through his resurrection, Christ is with us now and forevermore.

And so this Easter we celebrate the future hope of heaven, and the present peace of knowing that we will get through the nights on earth, together. *~Christina Webster Stanek*
