




First Reading Acts 2:14a, 36-41





Diaconate Ordination

April 30, 2023

In the Catholic Church there are two types of deacons- transitional and permanent. A transitional deacon is a candidate for the priesthood, who as part of his preparation has been ordained to the diaconate. A permanent deacon is a man who has received a particular vocation to ministry in the Church and for the Church.

On April 29th, the Ordination of Transitional Deacons will start a year of preparation for these men before they become priests. This Saturday, Seminarian Jeremy Stubbs will be ordained. On Sunday, he will have his first Mass as a deacon and preach the homily at the 9:30 Mass at the Oratory. Many of you may

remember Jeremy when he worked at St. Cecilia over the past summers, and he lived at St. Anthony rectory and helped serve at the Masses. As he moves on to this next big step, an exciting time for him and all of the men ordained this weekend, we must continue to pray. UNDERSTANDING THE MASS PART 1: Jesus Loves You!

The goal of this series of brief reflections is to help us grow in our understanding of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Before we can talk about the Mass, we need to be aware of a few basic principles, and then build on these to increase our knowledge of the Mass in addition to its purpose and goals. Like a house built on rock, these beginning articles will focus on basic principles forming a solid foundation upon which we will build our house of understanding. The first topic will be the Sacraments.

Jesus loves us. His love was evident when he died on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins. After his death but before his bodily ascension into Heaven, He wanted to leave behind a way for all of us to interact with Him; a way each of us could have a personal encounter with Him as the living, risen Lord. He did this by first creating the Church on earth as His Body, then entrusting to it the seven Sacraments, which He instituted as the most powerful method of having our own personal encounter with Him. There are many ways of having a personal encounter with Jesus but the deepest personal encounters come only through the seven Sacraments.

The next article will delve a little deeper into the definition of a Sacrament and how Jesus is made present through them.



Know Your Saints: Sts. Simon and Jude


Jude is so named by Luke and Acts. Matthew and Mark call him Thaddeus. He is not mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels, except, of course, where all the apostles are mentioned. Scholars hold that he is not the author of the Letter of Jude. Actually, Jude had the same

name as Judas Iscariot. Evidently because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to "Jude" in English.

Simon is mentioned on all four lists of the apostles. On two of them he is called "the Zealot." The Zealots were a Jewish sect that represented an extreme of Jewish nationalism. For them, the messianic promise of the Old Testament meant that the Jews were to be a free and independent nation. God alone was their king, and any payment of taxes to the Romans—the very domination of the Romans—was a blasphemy against God. No doubt some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence. But many were the counterparts of modern terrorists. They raided and killed, attacking both foreigners and "collaborating" Jews. They were chiefly responsible for the rebellion against Rome which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70.



THE WORD IN YOUR HEART | 11

The Fourth Sunday of Easter

Acts of the Apostles 2:40. "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation."

I bet you had a visceral reaction to Peter's exhortation in today's first reading. If you're like me, you instantly imagine a specific kind of corruption—that species of evil that chafes your soul and causes you to cry out in hopelessness. While it is important to recognize the corruption of injustice and sinfulness, we can be tempted to compound evil by descending into fruitless finger pointing and blame gaming.

What to do? (Good question. Peter's audience asked the same thing — Acts 2:37.)

Peter gives us a concrete action plan: "Repent and be baptized" (Acts 2:38). If you are reading this, you've likely already been cleansed by the waters of redemption. (If not, please contact the parish office to schedule.) Accordingly, I will focus on repentance.

On the US Conference of Catholic Bishops website, the footnote for Acts 2:38 explains that "repentance is a positive concept, a change of mind and heart toward God reflected in the actual goodness of one's life." Salvation from corruption lies not in despair, outrage, or indignation (righteous or otherwise). Instead, salvation requires us to orient our intellects and spirits toward the Lord, the one who guides us in right paths.

The journey won't be easy. But thankfully, our Shepherd is good. ~Mike Keefe






